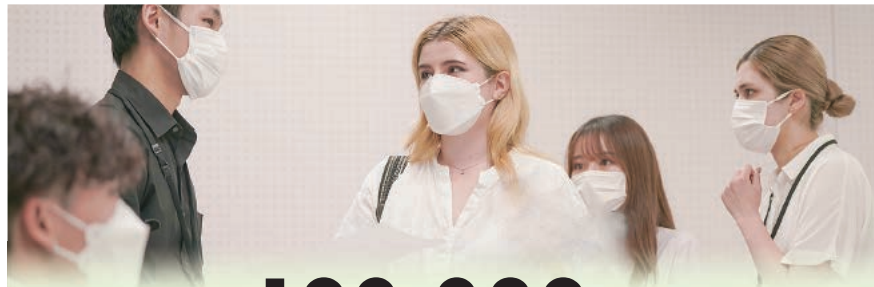




GLOBAL STUDIES

Since its establishment in 2011, the Global Studies program has provided students with an opportunity to learn about international relations in English. With 100 students per grade and a ratio of 50:50 Japanese to international students, students from approximately 30 different countries can learn together in a diverse, international environment while living in Kyoto.

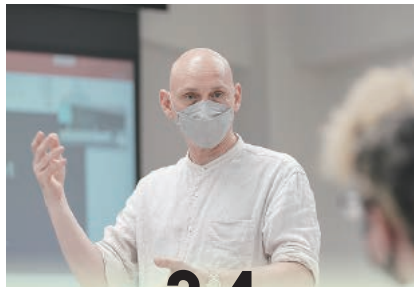

Curriculum Characteristics #02

Group Studies

Students take small-group courses from their first year through to their fourth year. They acquire academic skills through discussing and presenting in small classes, gradually developing the ability to organize their graduation research.

At the end of the second year, students select a seminar (a class of specialized exercises) to which they will belong for two years. In the third and fourth years, students research a topic of their interest under the guidance of their seminar supervisor, culminating in a graduation research project in the final semester of the fourth year.

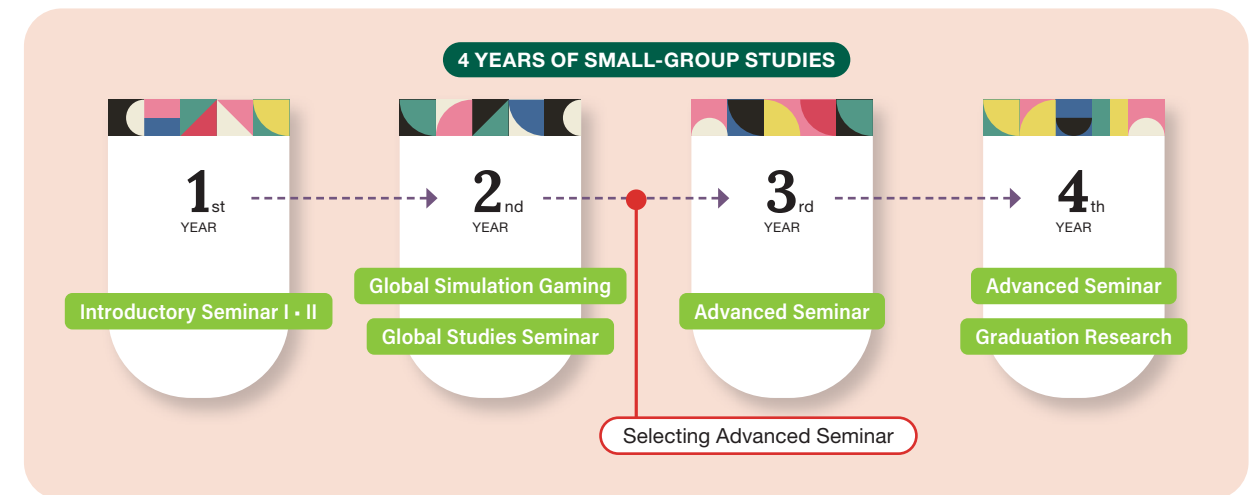


Advanced Seminar

In the 3rd and 4th years, students will select a seminar based on their aspirations. Here, along with other students who share a similar interest, they will learn for two years under the guidance of a supervisor and begin preparations for their graduation research. All students will be part of an Advanced Seminar, and in this atmosphere of friendly competition, they will compose a term paper that will serve as the basis for their graduation research.

Graduation Research

With the assistance of their supervisor and peers in the form of discussions and debates, students' studies will culminate in the completion of their graduation research project. What they learn over those four years will serve as the base from which they develop as members of society. The knowledge gained in the process of completing their graduation research in the College of International Relations will be vital when planning their future careers.

Distinctive learning

GSG Global Simulation Gaming

Simulation gaming to solve real international problems as an actor in the international community

Students act out the roles of federations (international organizations, NGOs, states, etc.) and engage in simulated international negotiations in order to solve real global issues. They take the initiative by developing a plan of action and carrying out negotiations in order to solve problems. In this way, they are able to utilize the knowledge they have acquired and apply it to the challenges facing modern society.



Zemi Research Convention

Annual convention to present research results in the College of IR

In the College of International Relations, students cultivate the ability to examine various issues faced by the international community from diverse political, economic, social, or cultural perspectives and then seek various ways to approach those issues. The Zemi Research Convention is a research convention that began in 2000, allowing students to give concrete shape to their learning and giving them a chance to make their studies known to people outside of the university. At the convention, students belonging to various seminars give presentations concerning their learning achievements to not only their peers and university faculty, but to a range of people from various walks of life. Since 2019, all teams have been required to make a poster for their presentations.



Curriculum Characteristics #03

Cross-Enrollment System

Many courses are offered in both English and Japanese, and can be taken regardless of one's major. This system allows students with sufficient language ability to take courses in either language.

The cross-enrollment system gives students a chance to participate in courses in both English and Japanese. This is a great opportunity that you probably would not have at other universities. Participating in courses that are not in your native language may seem tough, but it is a golden opportunity that I think should be taken advantage of.

Foreign Language Studies

Academic Skills is a compulsory course for all first and second-year students. This course is designed to improve students' reading, writing, presentation, and discussion skills in English. Students are placed in classes according to ability and set targets based on their level of proficiency. This is meant to help students improve their language skills in preparation for more advanced-level courses offered in English as well as for study abroad programs. Optional intensive courses are also offered (Intensive English I-VI) to help students improve their TOEFL® or IELTS scores.

Upon admission, all native and high-level (N1) Japanese-speaking first-year students will select a primary foreign language course from French, German, Spanish, Chinese, or Korean. All other overseas students will take a Japanese language course.

There are also intermediate and advanced-level language, communications and specialized courses, etc. for students wishing to continue their foreign language studies beyond their second year.

Studying Abroad

While studying abroad is optional, 30-40% of students from International Relations participate in long-term study abroad programs of six months to a year. Before or after studying abroad, students can maintain and improve their English by taking specialized courses offered in English.
